Dear Friends,

Over the first half of 2025, the Board of Trustees undertook a thoughtful and introspective strategic planning process under the direction of Strategic Planning Committee Chair Patty MacFarlane. For the second year in a row, the Cancer Foundation funded 100% of Ridley-Tree Cancer Center's unrestricted program grant request for patient supportive care programs.



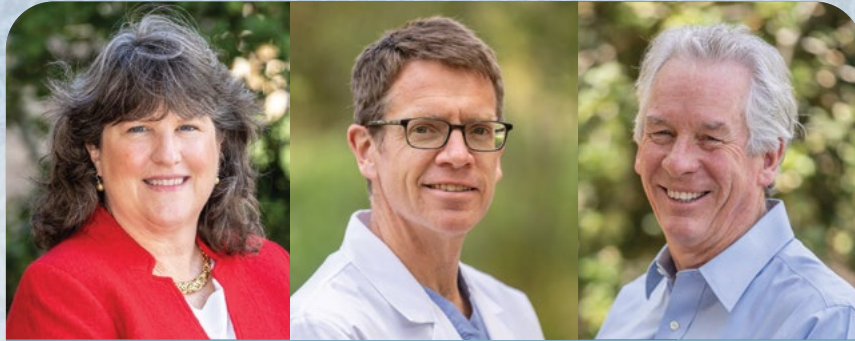
INAUGURAL GRANTS AWARDED

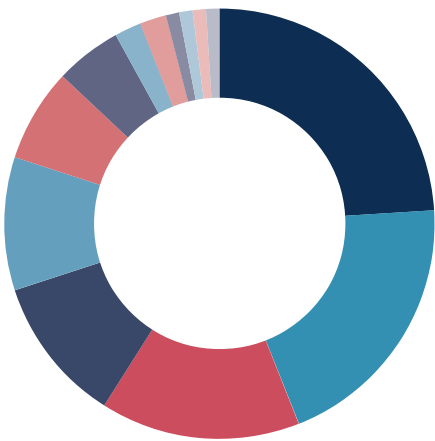

ONCOLOGY NUTRITION

For nearly two decades, Dawn Elliott has been a steady and compassionate guide for patients at Ridley-Tree Cancer Center. As Patient Navigation Manager, she and her team help individuals and families navigate one of life's most disorienting experiences – coordinating care and connecting patients to resources.

Last fall, Dawn gained a new perspective on that work. After a routine annual mammogram, she was diagnosed with stage two triple-negative breast cancer. Suddenly, the person who had spent years helping others access care became a patient herself.

Now midway through chemotherapy, with surgery and possible radiation still ahead, Dawn has come to rely on the same services she has long championed for others. Among the most important has been the Cancer Foundation-funded nutrition program.

“It’s gratifying to see that the system of supportive care really works.”

Oncology nutritionist Pam Wells joined Dawn’s care team at the start of treatment. With long-standing digestive issues and new chemotherapy-related side effects, Dawn quickly found the support invaluable. “She reminded me to give myself grace, to be flexible and to make what I did eat count – eat the good stuff, stay hydrated, get enough protein,” Dawn said.

Because Pam meets with Dawn during infusion appointments, the care is both expert and seamless. “She is always well informed, having reviewed my chart and lab results before we meet,” Dawn said. “Having Pam sit with me during treatment allows us to talk through everything without time pressure or interruptions.” For Dawn, the experience has reinforced just how much these donor-funded services matter.

That standard of care is made possible by the generosity of Cancer Foundation donors.

PATIENT NAVIGATION PROGRAM

When Angela De Bruyn was diagnosed with breast cancer in November 2024, the news came as a profound shock. At 44, with no family history of cancer and no warning signs beyond a lump she discovered herself, she was suddenly facing biopsies, surgery, chemotherapy and radiation.

“It was overwhelming,” she said. “There’s testing, surgery, treatment, paperwork, insurance questions – and it just keeps coming.”

From the very beginning, one service made a tremendous difference: patient navigation, funded by the Cancer Foundation of Santa Barbara.

“A cancer diagnosis is something you can never prepare yourself for. But the services I received at Ridley-Tree Cancer Center helped me navigate the impact of the diagnosis. I felt like an active participant in my care and I can’t say enough about how grateful I am.”

“My navigator reached out immediately and broke each stage down into manageable steps, providing structure and reassurance, and helping me understand what to expect along the way.”

For Angela, a single mother with family out of state, that guidance was invaluable – and it opened doors to additional resources. Her navigator connected her with counseling services, a nutritionist, and even a one-time financial grant that helped bridge the gap while she was on disability. “They made me aware of so many resources I wouldn’t have found on my own,” she said.

Perhaps most importantly, the help allowed Angela to focus on her own mental health and being present for her son. “The support I received there changed my whole experience for the better,” she said.

That coordinated care is made possible by Cancer Foundation grants that help ensure that no patient has to navigate a cancer diagnosis alone.





Art & Carolyn Merovick

PATIENT ASSISTANCE

For nearly two decades, Art Merovick served as Development Director of the Cancer Foundation of Santa Barbara, witnessing firsthand the financial hardships that accompany a cancer diagnosis. When he retired, the Foundation honored his contributions by establishing a named endowment fund to support patient medical care, seeded by a \$200,000 gift from his family. Years of personal outreach to friends and family – combined with strong market growth – have since built the fund to more than \$5.5 million, far exceeding its original \$1 million goal.

“My friendships and family have been critical to the success of this fund,” said Art, who also credits the endowment model’s long-term vision, ensuring support for patients not just today, but for generations to come, because, as he puts it simply, “I’m afraid this disease is not going away.”

The fund’s impact is both practical and profound. A 48-year-old self-employed photographer and lifelong Santa Barbara resident, diagnosed with breast cancer in 2024, was forced to stop working with no access to State Disability benefits. Support from the Merovick Fund helped her continue treatment – support she still relies on today. An 82-year-old grandfather, living on Social Security while navigating metastatic melanoma since 2005, was awarded charity care in 2023, allowing him to continue rising-cost treatments without sacrificing his basic needs.

“Our hope is that this fund allows people to give all their energies and spirit toward their treatment, and not be burdened with the financial albatross that comes with it.”

For Merovick – who lost a daughter to cancer, watched his father treated at the Cancer Center, and has been a patient himself for two years – the mission is deeply personal. His vision now is to help the fund grow beyond its current circle of supporters, broadening its base to become a cause embraced by the wider Santa Barbara community. The need, he says, will only continue to grow – and so must the response.

Organic Soup Kitchen

PARTNERSHIP HIGHLIGHT

The Organic Soup Kitchen prepares and delivers nutrient-dense, complete and balanced meals, known as SoupMeals, to vulnerable residents. Approximately 50-60% of their clients have a cancer diagnosis, many of whom are referred by Ridley-Tree Cancer Center. Many patients with advanced-stage cancers and those undergoing treatment have very specific dietary needs, and they often struggle to keep food down, which can lead to malnutrition. Each recipe is carefully formulated with 10 to 20 medicinal-quality, whole-food ingredients designed to strengthen the immune system, increase energy and support healing and recovery. While the plant-based SoupMeals are nutritious, they may be unappealing or difficult for some cancer patients to swallow or digest. Instead, many cancer patients frequently request comforting options like Ginger and Turmeric Bone Broth, Chicken and Rice, or Vegetables and Chicken Broth. The Cancer Foundation's grant helps Organic Soup Kitchen offer these meat-based soups to their clients along with plant-based options.

Partnering with Ridley-Tree Cancer Center

As the leaseholder and largest annual donor to Ridley-Tree Cancer Center, the Cancer Foundation commits the majority of the proceeds from its endowment and fundraising efforts to support cancer diagnosis, treatment, research, technology and support programs.

The Cancer Foundation of Santa Barbara was founded in 1949 on a promise – a promise that continues today – to provide the highest quality of cancer care to everyone in the Santa Barbara community.

When Lillian Taylor Converse was diagnosed with cancer, she had to travel to Los Angeles for her treatments. Though she knew there was little chance of her own recovery, she had a strong desire to help others with the disease, so her husband, Elisha Converse, provided a generous gift to purchase a one million volt x-ray machine to establish the Cancer Foundation. Lillian's physician, Dr. Henry Ullmann, was able to treat cancer patients in Santa Barbara, which established the community as the leading provider of cancer care on the central coast.

The generosity exhibited by the Converse family has grown into a community tradition with a 75-year history of advancing the diagnosis, treatment, prevention and cure of cancer for all patients in our community. Today the physicians and staff of Ridley-Tree Cancer Center assist those on their journey with cancer, while the Cancer Foundation maintains its singular focus on fundraising and grant-making in support of this important work.



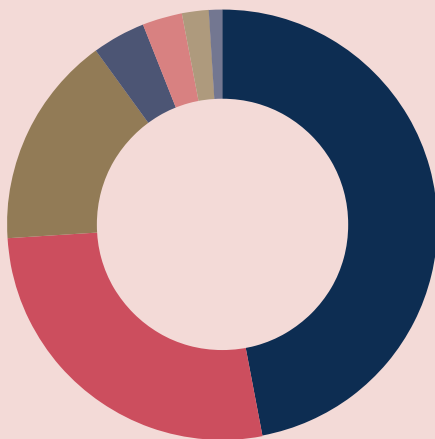

Sue and Scott Suttner

When Sue Suttner was diagnosed with Triple Negative Breast Cancer in 2014, she didn't know what to expect. What she found at the Cancer Center of Santa Barbara (now Ridley-Tree Cancer Center) was a team that coordinated her care and ensured she didn't have to navigate the journey alone. A nurse navigator connected her to a social worker for emotional support, a genetic counselor reached out for testing, a nutritionist guided her through treatment, and a caregiver class helped her husband Scott understand how to support her at home. "It's like every detail was taken care of," she recalled. "It helped me as I maneuvered through the mental and physical effects of treatment."

So moved by her experience, Sue became a volunteer at Ridley-Tree, where she witnessed firsthand the reach of the Center's reputation – greeting patients who had traveled up to six hours for care. "They told me it was a long drive, but they wouldn't go anywhere else," she said. "We have some of the best surgeons and oncologists in the country right here."

Nearly ten years after her first diagnosis, Sue faced another aggressive tumor. She returned to Ridley-Tree, where the advances she witnessed were remarkable. In 2014, her treatment required 33 rounds of radiation. By 2024, the Center's state-of-the-art technology allowed for precisely targeted therapy, dramatically reducing the number of treatments needed. In addition to conventional chemotherapy, she also received immunotherapy, a treatment that simply hadn't existed a decade earlier. "In the ten years between my two diagnoses, I've seen so many advancements that can help make it better for patients," she said.

It is that progress and the compassionate programs that supported her through both journeys that inspired Sue and Scott to include a bequest to the Cancer Foundation of Santa Barbara in their estate plans.

Rancheros Visitadores Ride to Support Local Cancer Care

Each year as the spring hits its peak, the Rancheros Visitadores continue their annual tradition of parading through the streets of Solvang to Mission Santa Inés while also raising funds for the Cancer Foundation.

Since 2012, in conjunction with their annual ride, the Rancheros Visitadores, in partnership with Wrangler, have raised funds for the Cancer Foundation. As the largest contributor to Ridley-Tree Cancer Center, the Cancer Foundation of Santa Barbara funds a variety of research and supportive care programs at Ridley-Tree Cancer Center, both in Solvang and Santa Barbara, to help residents on their journey with, through and beyond cancer.

The late Steve Beneto initiated the annual fundraising campaign in conjunction with the ride. In 2025, Rancheros Visitadores' members shattered their previous fundraising record raising more than \$200K. Together, members have now donated more than \$1.73M to the Cancer Foundation of Santa Barbara over the last 13 years as they seek to surpass \$2M by May of 2027.

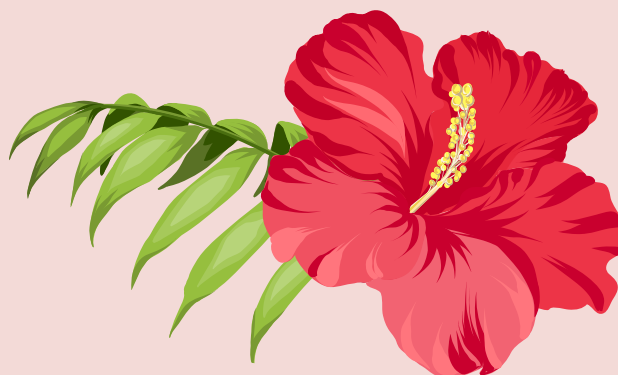

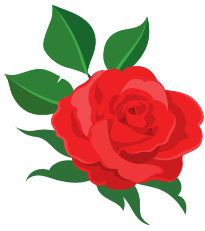
Arthur J. Merovick Endowment for Patient Assistance

Proceeds support the programs and services that ensure psychological, social and financial stresses associated with the diagnosis and treatment of cancer are addressed.
